HAITI PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

GRACE CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

- 10,713 patients were tested for tuberculosis
- 343 patients were treated for tuberculosis
- 1,347 infants were fully vaccinated
- 3,457 pregnant women were monitored
- 2,234 gynecological exams were performed
- 12,096 patients received family planning
- 6,187 people living with HIV/AIDS were supported by GCH
- 1,269 children treated for diarrhea

- 9,576 children were treated at the pediatric clinic
- 49,015 lab tests were analyzed
- 7,477 radiological photographs were taken

URBAN COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAM

- 40,284 children were weighed and monitored
- 82 traditional birth attendants were trained
- 12,342 children ages 0-5 were vaccinated
- 611 health education meetings were held in ICC clinics

OUTPATIENT CLINIC

- An average of 305 patients were treated per day
- An average of 60 patients were seen daily at the eye clinic
- 17,041 people received HIV/AIDS testing
- 2,909 patients were treated with anti-retroviral (ARV) therapy
- 214 new patients received ARV therapy
- 18,709 women received reproductive health services (in and out patient)

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION

- Rehabilitation services provided to 108 children with disabilities., 37 girls, 71 boys
- The program currently has 2 Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Coordinators and 6 CBR workers
- 2157 home visits were made by CBR workers
- Activities during a visit include: start with a prayer, post exam from the activity left the week before, pre-test of the new activity to be left, model new activity to the mother, have mother model the activity to the promoter, go over the paperwork to be filled out, do continuous evaluation of one of the 5 developmental areas to choose an activity to be prepared for the next week, and finish with some play activity for the child or reading a story, sing a song, etc.

SCHOOL INCLUSION

- 17 children enrolled and receiving one hour of remedial teaching each week
- 2 schools participating
