# HAITI PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

#### GRACE CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

- 11,771 patients were tested for tuberculosis
- 314 patients were treated for tuberculosis
- 1,891 infants were fully vaccinated
- 4,283 pregnant women were monitored
- 2,393 gynecological exams were performed
- 13,297 patients received family planning
- 2,548 people living with HIV/AIDS were supported by GCH
- 1,463 children treated for diarrhea

# **OUTPATIENT CLINIC**

- An average of 338 patients were treated per day
- An average of 51 patients were seen daily at the eye clinic
- 17,445 people received HIV/AIDS testing
- 2,548 patients were treated with anti-retroviral (ARV) therapy
- 253 new patients received ARV therapy

- 16,496 women received reproductive health services (in and out patient)

- 775 women received reproductive health services in the integrated community health program
- 1,463 children received oral hydration therapy
- 1,301 traditional birth attendants were trained
- 5,977 people were reached through health education meetings held in ICC clinics

# DOMINICAN REPUBLIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

#### COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION

- Rehabilitation services provided to 130 children with disabilities., 45 girls, 85 boys
- The program currently has 1 Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Coordinator and 6 CBR workers
- 3342 home visits were made by CBR workers
- Activities during a visit include: start with a prayer, post exam from the activity left the week before, pretest of the new activity to be left, modeling new activity to the mother, have mother model the activity to the promoter, going over the paperwork to be filled out and finish with some play activity for the child or reading a story, sing a song, etc.

#### COMMUNITY HEALTH DEVELOPMENT

- A total population of 520 people impacted by health services
- Trained promoters in RBC guidelines, community workshops on discrimination, disability, autism spectrum, child development screening, calculation of child's development quotient based on the individual Portage checklists
- Provided 51 training sessions for mothers promoting physical rehabilitation for children with cerebral palsy
- 24 meetings to review individual plans and case analysis with Community Health Care Workers
- 12 meetings to review overall process monitoring

# SCHOOL INCLUSION

- 17 children enrolled
- 2 schools participating
