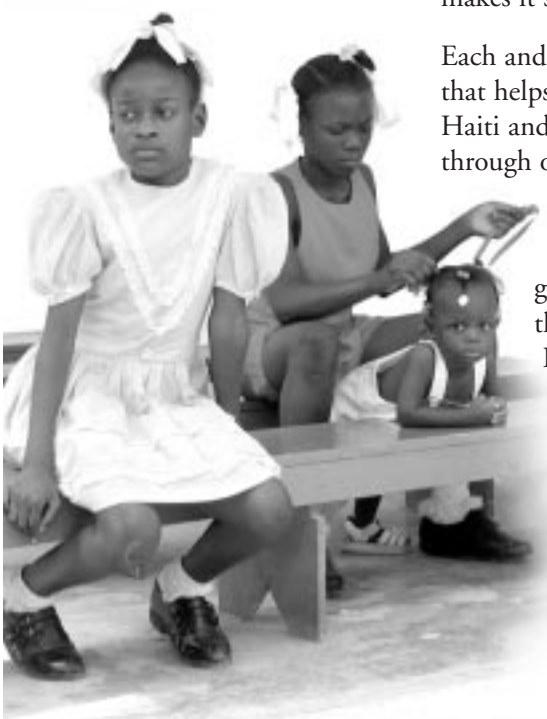

## International Child Care Partners with Canadian Feed the Children

During the summer of 2003, International Child Care began a new and strategic partnership with Canadian Feed the Children (CFTC). CFTC's goal is to alleviate the impact of poverty on children. They work with local partners overseas and in Canada to enhance the well-being of children and the self-sufficiency of their families and communities.

Thanks to the networking efforts of Eric Barton, a long-time friend of ICC, a meeting was arranged between myself, Jim Dahl, CFTC's Executive Director, and Andre Leite, a Project Manager, to discuss partner project possibilities.

That meeting was extremely positive and resulted in a further meeting between Dr. Harry Geffard, ICC's Haiti Director General, and Madsen Gachette, CFTC's Field Director in Haiti. They quickly developed a \$20,000 project aimed at improving the care and nutrition of children hospitalized at Grace Children's Hospital.

Funds were urgently needed to rehab the hospital's kitchen facilities and provide air conditioning to the pharmacy for the storage of life saving drugs. In addition, the project funded the purchase of high-quality food supplements for children requiring specialized diets.

Construction was carried out through the fall months and was completed in time for Christmas. International Child Care and Dr. Geffard were recently featured on Vision TV December 30, 2003, as part of a focus on Canadian Feed the Children. The program was entitled "Strength from the Ground Up" and documented Haitian Madsen Gachette and the three partner organizations that CFTC is working with in Haiti.

A second project with CFTC is already in the planning for the 1st quarter of 2004 for \$100,000 to improve the quality of life and nutritional status of people living in ICC's intervention area in the Northern department (Grand Riviere and Bahun). By developing a partnership with Canadian Feed the Children, ICC is endeavoring to reinforce its capacity to meet the needs of people in these northern communities.

## Partnerships in Pastoral Care

As the current Chaplain at Grace Children's Hospital, I am excited to share about our partnerships in the area of pastoral or spiritual care. Our partners in this work are many and very faithful!

Every morning our work at Grace Children's Hospital (GCH) begins with a time of prayer in each clinic. On Mondays and Fridays, we also hold morning devotions, including Scripture reading, singing and a short message, in the outpatient TB clinic for staff and patients. There is a group of wonderful GCH staff members who share in the responsibility for this effort - Antonyne, one of the nurses in the TB clinic; Reynold, a computer technician; Maud, GCH's manager of administrative services; Appolos, a laboratory technician; as well as various other personnel from the clinics. All of them do this in addition to their regular work responsibilities and are committed partners in the spiritual care of all our patients and staff.

In our inpatient children's ward, I was expecting my work to be more like that of a traditional hospital chaplain, but was pleased to discover that that work is regularly done by the mamans, auxiliaries (nurse's aides), nurses and doctors. Throughout the course of each day, there are many occasions for prayer and conversation as children and their families face the crises of serious illness and the celebration of healing. As a staff, we partner together daily to provide pastoral care in this setting.

I am also fortunate to have North American visitors as partners in care for the children. Whether people visit the hospital in person, or send greetings via mail, you are all partners as we provide for the spiritual and emotional needs of the children here at Grace Children's Hospital. Thank you for partnering with ICC to provide health and hope for the children of Haiti!

# ICC Celebrates Milestone in the Dominican Republic

In November, International Child Care celebrated a milestone in its organizational history. After 15 years of operating under the legal auspice of ICC/USA, ICC/Dominican Republic has become an official and fully recognized partner of the organization under the Spanish name of Cuidado Infantil Dominicano (CID). The new board, under the presidency of Antolin Rodriguez, has received their official charter as a fully recognized non-governmental organization in the Dominican Republic.

To celebrate this important step towards independence, the Joint Ministry Council of ICC has officially recognized Cuidado Infantil Dominicano as one of the four partners in health development with the signing of the amended Joint Ministry Agreement of International Child Care. The meetings, held in November 2003, took place in Santiago, Dominican Republic and were an historical event in the history of International Child Care.

One of the unique aspects of the Joint Ministry of International Child Care is the fact that all four organizations (ICC/Haiti, ICC/DR, ICC/USA and ICC/Canada) share the same Vision and Mission. It is this shared vision and mission that binds us together and makes International Child Care strong and committed to work coordinated and united towards health and wholeness for children and families in empowered communities on the island of Hispaniola.

## ICC and Partnership in Haiti

International Child Care's pioneers recognized by the early 1970s that they could not achieve their vision of "Health and wholeness for children and families in empowered communities" by themselves. Within just a few years of taking care of children with tuberculosis at Grace Children's Hospital, they realized that their initiative would not have a real impact unless they participated with other tuberculosis control programs across the country.

With that realization, they searched and eventually obtained, through the Crusade Against Tuberculosis (CAT), an agreement with Haiti's Ministry of Health to work together to address this important public health problem that was affecting a high number of the Haitian people. ICC's contribution to this new partnership was to bring their BCG vaccine mass campaign and their Case Finding and Treatment program to existing health centers throughout the country with the aim of reducing the spread of the tuberculosis. In 1990, the Case Finding and Treatment program became known as the National TB Program in which ICC is the most important partner.



This partnership notion, by doing with rather than doing for, is part of International Child Care's philosophy and is an vital part of the relationships ICC has within every level of its ministry.
